## **Grants provide spark to** Canada 150 celebrations

A digital dig into the past, an enhancement of aquatic habitat at an abandoned marina and the restoration of a naval monument are among eight projects local groups received funding for Monday from the Windsor Essex Community Foundation as part of celebrations for Canada's 150th anniversary.

The eight recipients receiving an overall total of \$74,000 were the Windsor Symphony Society, University of Windsor, County of Essex, Town of Tecumseh, Essex County Field Naturalists' Club, Royal Canadian Naval Association, the Harrow and Colchester South chamber and the Town of Lakeshore.

The University of Windsor will use its funding to launch Digging and Imag(in)ing Windsor-Essex History: 150 Years and Beyond, which will involve digging through history figuratively and literally, using technology to scan below the earth to create images from the area's past and linking them with artifacts and photos.

The Essex County Field Naturalists' Club will use its grant to transform an abandoned marina near Point Pelee National Park into a wildlife habitat area by enhancing conditions both in the water and on land. The amount of Carolinian forest will be enhanced.

The Royal Canadian Naval Association will use its grant to update

our Canadians who served in the Royal Canadian Navy in the Cold War and Afghanistan.

"We are so pleased to get the money," said Tom Bain, who accepted cheques on behalf of both the county as warden and Lakeshore as mayor.

"We have been working on committees to get programs in place to celebrate Canada's 150th, but it's an area where we don't have a lot of money to do that. This helps allow us to have one huge day to celebrate.'

The foundation's funds will largely be used to bring in more and higher-calibre entertainment

## House sold for \$100,000 above asking price

In fact, just a week ago, Bondy sold a home in LaSalle for \$100,000 over list price. Also, Bondy recently sold a house to an eager out-oftown buyer by showing it to him through FaceTime on her smartphone as she walked through the

Low interest rates and a low unemployment rate are factors, said Bondy, as are the relatively affordable prices compared to Toronto. But she also believes people find much to like locally, with Detroit next door, an airport, nice weather and more.

"People from Toronto are all paying off their mortgages or having very low mortgages by coming here," she said.

"So they're able to live very nicely in this area.

"And it's not just retirees. Families are moving down here now. We're seeing more of that in the last six months."

Bondy said her husband, Jovan Vujovic, who owns Signature Homes Windsor, also fields increasing interest from the Toronto area for the new homes he builds, such as in a new subdivision near the Seven Lakes Golf Course. Kim Gazo, president of the

Windsor-Essex County Association of Realtors, said serious shoppers have even recently started coming from further afield than Ontario.

"We're even seeing investors from Vancouver, who didn't usually make it this far before," Gazo RISING

said. "They tended to stop in Toronto. I was surprised because it's pretty far to go. But we've got a lot to offer in Windsor, so why not?"

Numbers from the Windsor-Essex County Association of Realtors show Windsor-area home prices on a roll. In May, 791 properties sold for an average of \$282,000, compared to \$235,000 in May

What's more, Gazo predicts the hot housing market will remain on fire for a while.

"Things are going really well," Gazo said. "But there is still enough room for people to list their house. It's a great time. There are a lot of buyers and not enough inventory for them."
